Bethany students are on a learning journey to understand the What, Why and How they are learning. Over the past few years, there has been a consistent focus on developing learning intentions and success criteria.

Learning intentions are descriptions of what learners should know, understand and be able to do by the end of a learning period or unit. Learning intentions are the basis for tracking student progress, providing feedback and assessing achievement. In addition to learning intentions, students may also have individual learning goals that they address in their learning.

Success criteria are the measures used to determine whether, and how well, learners have met the learning intentions.


Leaning Intentions and Success criteria:


- Ensure all students know what they are going to learn and where they are heading
- Provide guidance to teachers on what their chosen teaching and learning activities are seeking to achieve
- Provide the basis for feedback and reduce discrepancies between current student understanding and intended learning
- Assist students and teachers in tracking and assessing student progress
- Help teachers to understand the impact of their teaching and learning activities, and when they may need to adapt or change these
- Help students understand what improved performance looks like




Learning Intentions and Success Criteria assist students in being able to articulate their learning when answering the following questions:

This year the students will be participating in a total of four Religious Literacy Assessments (RLA style assessments), one per term. The assessment of religious literacy focuses on students' knowledge and understanding of the key concepts that are being addressed and taught by the Religious Education program and the student's ability to make links to and communicate within their religious tradition.

At Bethany, the children are already familiar with this style of assessment. After completing the unit of work, they respond to a few questions related to the unit outcomes and key concepts being taught and then undertake a creative task showing their understanding of the message of the scripture in a creative form.



The pre and post testing of the key questions for their units will be used as a means to track students' progress in Religious Education. It will also provide valuable data in relation to our whole school RE goal and where to go next.

We will begin our work next week with the Lenten units across K - 6. The students will be pre-tested (and post-tested at the completion of the unit) on the following questions, according to their grades.

The units and questions are as follows:

Kindergarten - Lent / Easter: From Ashes to Easter

- 1. Identify and explain the signs and symbols of Lent and Easter.
- 2. Who is Jesus?
- 3. Re-tell the story of Jesus on the first Palm Sunday.
- 4. Explain what happened to Jesus on Good Friday.

Year 1 - Lent: Growing Together

- 1. How can Lent help me to be more like Jesus?
- 2. Explain how Jesus showed us how God wants us to live through the scripture of Zacchaeus.
- Describe how you can help others during Lent.

Year 2 - Lent: Being Alone

- Re-tell how Jesus used God's word and prayer to turn away from sin
- 2. Explain what God wants us to do in our own lives to be like Jesus?
- 3. Describe how Lent is a particular time for repentance?

Year 3 - Lent: Reaching Out

- 1. Explain how the celebration of Lent provides opportunities for personal growth in your own faith
- 2. Recall a scripture where Jesus reached out to others in loving service
- 3. Describe how the Holy Spirit enlivens and guides you to reach out to others.

Years 4, 5 & 6 - Lent: Practices & Promises

- 1. Identify and explain the three forms of Lenten promises
- 2. Jesus taught that the 10 Commandments consist of 2 great commandments. Determine the commandment most important in your own life
 How can you prepare for the Liturgical Season of Easter through the sacraments?

Thank you for the ongoing support in your child's understanding of religious education and guidance in the application of their faith to their own lives.

Early Years Assessments

Over the course of the next 2 weeks (weeks 6 and 7), teachers from Kindergarten to Year 2 will be assessing each student in their class using a variety of literacy assessments. This is a requirement of Catholic Education, Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP). The results of these assessments will assist teachers in planning literacy activities to meet the needs of the students in reading and writing. It will also provide information of where additional support, interventions and resourcing may be required within the classroom. The following information regarding Early Years Assessments (EYA) has been provided by CEDP.

"Kindergarten and Year 1 students are assessed using the Early Years Assessment at the beginning and end of the school year. The bottom 20% of Year 1 students are assessed on additional test items. All Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2 students are required to provide an instructional reading level.

Student assessment on school entry provides important benefits including:

For schools:

- Informing planning of learning/teaching opportunities for K/Year 1 students
- Identifying vulnerable students for targeted early intervention

For the System (CEDP):

- Providing one source of base-line data for continuous school improvement initiatives
- Informing strategic development for all schools at a system level
- Identifying schools across the Diocese that may require differential support

Literacy (and Numeracy) assessment tools offer an opportunity for teachers to understand a child's beliefs, attitudes, strengths, thinking process and skills. Teachers use instruments to individually interview students, and learn about how students think, and what they know.

The CEDP use the Literacy Early Years Assessment (EYA) Observation Survey of Early Literacy Achievement to assess students in Literacy. Improving learning outcomes for all students is at the heart of the Catholic Education, Diocese of Parramatta's (CEDP) strategic intent.

The National Inquiry into the Teaching of Literacy (2005) stated that, "the assessment of all children by their teachers at school entry and regularly during the early years of schooling is of critical importance to the teaching of reading, and in particular, to identify children who are at risk of not making adequate progress." They concluded that early assessment is a key responsibility of system and school literacy planning."

NUMERACY- Mrs Donlan

Last newsletter I outlined our school goal for numeracy in 2018. To recap, our goal is:

For all students to improve their ability to solve multi-step problems using a variety of strategies that focus on communicating, problem solving and reasoning.

Data collected from NAPLAN and PAT- M affirmed that this is an area for further development by students and staff.

As a result we have implemented a 'Problem of the Week' to our warm-up. This is now embedded in our teaching/learning & assessment practice and gives students the opportunity to engage in multi-step problems where they will be challenged to correctly calculate solutions, as well as give a written reflection on how they have solved the problem, why they solved it this way and prove correctness using an alternative strategy, all the while they are using the language/vocabulary associated with the topic. Our teachers are working hard to build their own capacity in this area to best meet the needs of the students.

Students will be self, peer or teacher assessed using a working mathematically rubric. Twice a term data will be collected to inform how we are meeting this goal. Our overall 'big data' will come from our next lot of PAT-M results that we will administer early in term 4 of 2018.

From time to time in the newsletter I will give examples of problems, as well as student work samples of their answers and reflection.

For today though here is a problem that comes from a recent NAPLAN Numeracy test.

Gina has only these coins. She buys a magazine for \$1.95. How much money does Gina have left? \$1.00 \$1.10 \$2.00 \$2.10

The question is multi-step in that students are required to total the coins as seen (addition) and then calculate how much money is left over after purchasing the \$1.95 magazine (subtraction).

Next newsletter the working mathematically rubric will be shared and unpacked.
