Staff Professional Learning

As Educational Leaders, we have a responsibility to ensure that all teachers are engaging in leadership activities at some level or another. Over the past two terms parents may have noted the number of Professional Learning opportunities that the Bethany staff are exposed to and engaged in. Building individual leadership capacity will impact on teams throughout our school and beyond.

Please find outlined below the ongoing learning opportunities that our teachers will be involved in over the next fortnight:

Week 2:

ATTENDANCE MATTERS - BE PUNCTUAL

Regular and punctual attendance at school is essential to assist children to maximise their potential. Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

The school day commences at 8:30am at Bethany. The morning music commences at 8:27am and concludes with the bell, where by this time, students have walked to class and are entering their classrooms.

Please note that gates will be closed at 8:30am with the bell. Staff on duty have classes, meetings and professional learning to attend to at this time. As such, the gates must be closed on time, as teachers have a duty of care to the students in their class and other responsibilities to attend to.

Similarly, the learning commences in all classrooms at 8:30am. Missing any part of the morning can mean that prayer has been missed, instructions have not been heard and routines have not been set in motion. As a consequence, students can find themselves disorientated and taking longer to settle into their learning.

Please ensure that students are on time at school every day and take into consideration the fact that the carpark does begin to get busy from 8:20am. Should unforeseen circumstances prevent you from arriving on time, please ensure that children are signed in at the office by an adult.

It is important that everyone works together to help children obtain the best possible start in life with a good education. It is vital that both school and parents encourage regular and punctual attendance at school.

ST. PADRE PIO CHILDREN'S MASSES

Jesus said, *"Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."*
- Mt. 19:14

As you would be aware, on the first Sunday of every month your children are invited to attend and participate in the St Padre Pio Children's Masses. The celebration of the Eucharist is essential to Christian life. These Masses are a wonderful opportunity for your children to celebrate and participate in parts of the Mass with other members of the Bethany and St. Padre Pio communities.

If your children ask why they "have to" attend Mass, explain to them that Mass is where we go to see and hear Jesus: "Jesus was born as a little baby because he wanted to be with us and share his love with us. After he went to be in heaven, he wanted to be even closer to us—all of us, all around the world—so he gave us some special ways of being close to him." One of these ways is by attending Mass on Sundays.

"Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I."
(Matthew 18:20)

By attending a Children's Mass or any Sunday Mass, children will come to learn that the celebration has so many purposes:

- The Mass is a time when Jesus is present with us
- The Mass is a time when we pray through words, actions and gestures
- The Mass is a time to listen and respond to God's Word
- The Mass is a community of believers gathered together
- The Mass is a memorial celebration
- The Mass is a thanksgiving celebration
- The Mass is a time when we share and celebrate our faith in Jesus
- The Mass is a time to share and to be nourished by God's gifts
- The Mass challenges us to go out and live as Jesus would

FOR REFLECTION

Below are some questions you could ask your child after they have attended Sunday Mass:

- Who are some people that you see when you go to Mass?
- When you are at Mass, what helps you to remember that Jesus is with you?
- What do you like doing at Mass that shows God that you are praying?
- Who do you like to talk to about Jesus?
- When you go to Mass, can you see a cross that helps us remember Jesus?
- When you pray, do you remember to thank God for everything He has given you?
- When you say Amen, which means 'I believe', do you say it like you mean it?
- What is your favourite food – that nourishes your body?
- What is your favourite part of Mass – that nourishes your heart and soul?
- What can you do to show others God's love?

Familiarity will help them more fully engage in the Sunday Eucharistic celebration. But it all begins with the first step! If your child has yet to attend one of our Children's Masses, why not come along next Sunday! The St Padre Pio hospitality committee will be there to make you feel welcome.

WHAT IS EXPECTED BEHAVIOUR OF THE STUDENTS AT BETHANY? HOW DO STUDENTS KNOW WHAT TO DO?

The behaviour that is expected from the children is based on the Bethany school expectations and the PBS4L Framework. These expectations were developed after consultation with the PBS4L team, teachers and children and serve as a base for the children's understanding of the behavioural expectations at Bethany.

The students at Bethany abide by the following three expectations.



HOW IS APPROPRIATE BEHAVIOUR REWARDED AT BETHANY?

All stakeholders are aware of how appropriate behaviour is rewarded at Bethany. The **PAW Award cards** were designed and developed to reward positive behaviours in the classroom and on the playground, stemming from our three school expectations.



Any staff member from the Bethany school community - Leadership, teachers, administration, support staff (Learning Support and Teacher's Aides) and even casuals hand out any PAW award to any child across the school setting during any time of the school day when they see students following the school expectations.

HOW IS INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOUR MANAGED AT BETHANY?

A **flowchart** has been designed by the PBS4L team and has been discussed with the leadership team, staff and students which explains what steps are to be taken when a student has breached one of the school expectations.

It is important that ALL KEY STAKEHOLDERS follow the flowchart for consistency.

BREACHES OF CONDUCT - MINOR & MAJOR INCIDENTS

Inappropriate behaviours are identified as breaches and are categorised as either Minor or Major.

- **Minor Breach** - Problem behaviours that are managed exclusively by individual staff members, typically (but not always) at the time of the incident.
- **Major Breach** - Problem behaviours that are referred to a third party, typically a Deputy or Principal, or a coordinator. Referrals can be immediate (unsafe or highly disruptive behaviour warranting immediate assistance/follow up) or as a result of repeated instances of minor behaviour that has not diminished in frequency despite repeated intervention. Such behaviours are also characterised as persistent minors.

Please note that the Major Breach is the same as the Red Slip from previous years.

REFLECTION ROOM

Students who have received a Major for inappropriate behaviour will be asked to attend the Reflection Room at lunch time. A staff member along with either a coordinator or a PBS4L team member is always rostered on Reflection Room duty.

Whilst in Reflection Room, children complete a reflection sheet that allows the child to reflect on their behaviour (one for Infants one for Primary) or other activity deemed appropriate to develop a changed attitude and / behaviour. If the student completes a written reflection this is filed in the folders kept in the Reflection Room and may be sent home to inform parents if deemed appropriate.

Parents are notified when either a serious breach of school rules occurs or when an undesirable pattern of behaviour begins to develop.

For students who receive 3 majors, a meeting is to be scheduled between the relevant Stage Coordinator, the classroom teacher and a parent or guardian to discuss going forward.

A Behaviour Management Plan may need to be developed, after consultation with the school Principal / Assistant Principal and the Diversity Leader.

At all times procedural fairness principles are observed.

NOTE: Parent / Teacher / Student conference and counselling for students is usually offered prior to reaching final stages of policy.

Matters which require further investigation by Stage Coordinators over more than one school day, must be communicated to parents/carers on the same day the incident occurred, to inform them that the process of investigation is underway.


Incidents which occur during transition from lunch and return to class will be reported to the Assistant Principal/Principal to follow up.
