Dear Parents

A blind man had been waiting a while at a busy road for someone to offer to guide him across, when he felt a tap on his shoulder. "Excuse me," said the tapper, "I'm blind; would you mind guiding me across the road?" The first blind man took the arm of the second blind man and they both crossed the road. After the event the first blind man, who was George Shearing the famous Jazz Pianist, commented: "What could I do? I took him across and it was the biggest thrill of my life!"

This incident illustrates that sometimes taking a risk can help reduce our dependency on others and lead to the discovery of new capabilities and personal satisfaction. When it comes to our children and risk taking, we would not want them to step out "blindly" when someone taps them on the shoulder and offer them a "dare". Part of raising our children is to help them to define boundaries. It's a balancing act that requires knowing when to let children take risks in safe environments, as against taking risks in situations where they would endanger themselves or others.

Taking risks allows children to understand the concept of trial and error. Success will certainly build selfconfidence within our children and, inevitably, failure will not only make them acknowledge their boundaries, but will provide them with opportunities to cope with the negative emotions that accompany failure.

Self-confident children have the inner fortitude to try new things, even if there is a possibility of failure. So, if we can control our urge to step in and provide solutions, we may witness our children engage in creative thinking; also, we might witness our children explore their own abilities and rejoice in their own accomplishments.

It's possible, that we parents might guide our children away from challenging situations, so we won't be inconvenienced in some way. "However, children's development involves taking risks and operating outside of their comfort zone. If we constantly prevent our children from taking risks, they may stagnate within their own comfort zone and impede their own development." David Eager. University of Technology, Sydney.

Positive risk-taking behaviour can be most beneficial to our children and the more practice they have with identifying risks and acting accordingly, the better prepared they will be to handle potentially dangerous situations and to solve problems in the future.

Of course, our children need to know how to differentiate between good, healthy risks, such as bush walking and bad destructive risks, such as sitting endlessly with computer games and being a possible candidate for childhood obesity.

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE, con't

Risk-taking allows our children to try new physical activities, test the limits of their physical, intellectual and emotional development and gain mastery over their bodies. Risk-taking prepares our children for interaction with the real world beyond what might be our over-protective homes. If our children are not exposed to risk taking, they could become fearful and timid children who lack confidence and decisionmaking skills.

Let us be reminded of the sign when we enter our school everyday...



On September 1918, the five wounds of our Lord's Passion appeared on St Padre Pio's hands, feet and side which is known as the stigmata. Padre Pio was the first priest in the history of the church to be stigmatized. He bore the wounds of Christ for fifty years.

Many, many people came to St Padre Pio to ask for God's



forgiveness in Reconciliation and many more found help and guidance

For his whole life Padre Pio spent many long hours praying and living a very strict life. Through the letters that he wrote, it is clear that he went through overwhelming suffering, physically and spiritually. He had a great love for God, the Blessed Eucharist and Mary, our Blessed Mother.

Padre Pio died on 23rd September, 1968. He bore the wounds of Christ for fifty years.

Many years later, on 16th June 2002, Padre Pio was canonized by Pope John Paul II and was declared a saint. An estimated 300,000 people attended the canonization ceremony.



WHS UPDATE - Emergency Management Plan / Drills LOCKDOWNS Explained

"Tell me and I forget, teach me, and I may remember, involve me and I learn." ~ Benjamin Franklin ~

All schools have an obligation under Work Health Safety legislation to ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable, a safe and healthy working and learning environment for all students and personnel, including employees, volunteers, visitors and contractors.

Underpinning this legal obligation is our commitment to the development of a positive safety culture in our school so that the health, safety and welfare of all employees, students, and other persons who are legally present on school premises can be protected.

Emergency drills are carried out regularly so that the school community can respond **calmly**, **quickly and safely**. Schools are legally obligated to undertake at least one drill every term (evacuation drills and lockdown drills). There are two types of drills - announced, where teachers are made aware of a specific day when a drill will be taking place and prepare the students according to the school procedures, and unannounced drills, where teachers know a drill will be occurring that week, but not when. It is vital for all staff to know exactly what to do in the event of any emergency. At Bethany, we conduct emergency drills regularly to assist staff to know their roles and responsibilities in any **emergency** situation in accordance with the workplace plans and procedures, and to test the workforce response to an **emergency**.

Lockdown is a procedure used to minimise risk to the school population when there is an immediate and imminent threat. School staff, students and visitors are secured in the rooms they currently occupy and no one is allowed to leave until instructed it is safe to do so.

Lockdown procedures may need to be implemented in the case of potentially dangerous situations arising within the school or nearby community eg. hazardous material incident, incidents involving firearms, unwanted visitors or intruders and severe storm.

Bethany's procedures for a lockdown include a pre-arranged signal <u>different to the signal alarm to</u> <u>evacuate classrooms or the premises.</u> This is a **pre-arranged message** relayed through the whole school speaker system. We do not sound the **Fire evacuation alarms during a lockdown**.

At Bethany we have two types of lockdowns:

- one to address a mild situation
- one to address a serious situation

Depending on the seriousness of the threat, the announcement of a <u>blue day</u> or <u>black day</u> will be made through the whole school microphone, known as an "all call'. Lockdowns can occur both during class times and during break times. For this reason, drills are important as students must be clear of the procedures to follow in any situation.

A <u>blue day</u> if the situation is mild - A mild situation could include a stray animal or wild weather. A <u>black day</u> if the situation is serious - A serious situation could include an intruder.

These terms were carefully chosen for the Bethany community as the students are aware of other 'coloured' days eg

Red Day Orange Day All children stay inside the classrooms at break times due to extreme weather. All children can play outside during break times, but not on the grassed areas due to previous wet conditions.

Green Day All children can play outside in all areas of the school playground.

Some children, especially younger ones, find the notion of an unwanted visitor or intruder particularly frightening. Lockdown drills may upset some students despite clear reassurances that the danger is not real. Teachers remind children that drills are only a practice and at no time will they be in actual danger. Specific references to actual incidents are avoided. Regardless of whether the situation is a drill or actual lockdown, at no point in time are students alerted to the difference. The intention there, is to ensure that students are kept calm and not alarmed. Following these procedures, all classroom teachers would debrief with their class to reassure them that they are safe at school.

In the case of an actual serious lockdown (black day), the whole community will be informed after the appropriate chain of command have been notified.

We thank you for recognising the importance of our legal obligation in developing WHS practices that ensure the safety and welfare of our whole school community.






LIBRARY
