PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Bethany Families,

During 2020 we celebrate the bicentenary of Australia's first Catholic school. Australia's first Catholic school was opened in October 1820. The school was in Hunter Street, Parramatta, taught 31 students – seven of whom were not Catholics.

There are now more than **1,750 Catholic schools** nationally, educating some **765,000 students**. We are proud at Bethany Primary to be one of these Catholic schools serving this community of St Padre Pio Parish, Glenmore Park. One in five Australian students attends a Catholic school – a remarkable achievement in just 200 years. This 200-year milestone gives us all an opportunity to re-visit the history of Catholic education and its ongoing effect on the lives of students and families throughout our nation.

It is a story of **courage** and **determination** with heroes like St Mary of the Cross Mackillop. A woman whose extraordinary faith, vision and passion made education available to ordinary Australian children from various walks of life – both in the cities like Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane and Adelaide as well as country areas such as Penola in South Australia where Mary established her first school originally in a stable and then a school house (which still stands today).

Mary and her Sisters of St Joseph travelled great distances on foot to set up schools all over this Great Southern Land of the Holy Spirit. They often travelled on horseback using the tracks made through the bush by wallabies. The **wallaby tracks** helped the sisters to find their way to isolated towns and communities where new Catholic school were opened and lives transformed.

Mary's motto of, **"Never see a need without doing something about it"**, became the call to mission for the Sisters of St Joseph to educate the poor, marginalised and outcast. The power of Catholic education was, and still is, its ability to change lives for the better.

As we celebrate 200 years of Catholic Education in Australia we give thanks for the selflessness of the many men and woman across our country whose God-inspired **vocation** has ensured that children have been provided with the gift of education enabling them to learn, grow and be nurtured by the great commandment given to us by Christ Himself - **To Love One Another**.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Staff Professional Learning

Successful professional development and learning is characterised by working together to understand, enhance and evaluate the impact of teachers on their students. Although professional development is specific to individual learning needs of staff, it is the collaborative nature of the learning with others that makes the difference.

Please find outlined below the ongoing learning opportunities that our teachers will be involved in over the next fortnight.

Week 7

- Tuesday 10th March - Miss Joseph will engage in Reading Recovery Training alongside other colleagues across the Parramatta Diocese

Week 8

- Tuesday 17th March - The following members of the leadership team will be engaging in the Growing Great Leaders program: Mr Rosato, Miss Joseph, Mrs Donlan, Ms Biordi and Miss Ahern. This program will continue intermittently across the 2020 school year.

Do you know what your child's goals are?

Visible Learning is the result of more than 20 years of research undertaken by Professor John Hattie. The meta-study synthesises over 800 meta-analyses (roughly 250 million learners) relating to the influences on achievement in school-aged students. In short this ongoing study has concluded so far that, almost all strategies when implemented correctly will have an impact on student learning, but the focus of Hattie's work was 'what works best' and what provides the most success in learning.

The big idea is 'know thy impact'. Hattie argues that expert teachers will regularly evaluate the effects they have on their students and adjust their teaching methods accordingly. In other words, teachers need to be continually aware of the impact they have on their students and from the evidence of this impact, they need to make decisions about changing approaches.

Professor Hattie defines Visible Learners as students who can:

- Articulate what they are learning
- Explain the next steps in their learning
- Set learning goals
- See errors as opportunities for further learning
- Know what to do when they are stuck
- Seek feedback.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE cont'd

At Bethany, our goal is to develop assessment capable visible learners. Learning Intentions and Success Criteria are displayed in all classrooms across the school to help learners know, 'where am I going?', 'How am I going?', and 'where to next?'. Our goal as expert teachers is to develop learners who can set goals, articulate what they are learning, and set some 'next steps' in their learning.

Effective teachers are transparent with students about what they are learning and why. They assist students in setting goals for themselves. Through this process students are encouraged to see their areas of strength, as well as what they need to work on more.

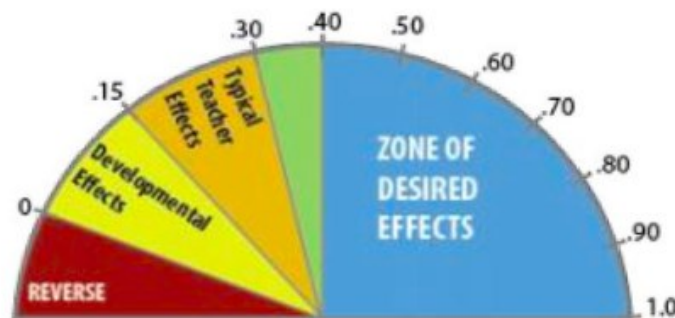
Tonight I encourage all parents to ask their child or children, "what are your goals this term?" Some possible questions to support this conversation are: What would you like to achieve? What do you want to get better at? Is there a new skill you would like to learn? If they haven't already done so at school, encourage your child to write their goal down.

The next step is turn these words into actions. Ask your child how they will go about achieving this goal. For example, will they take more care with their writing? Will they read over their calculations in Mathematics? Will they self-correct when reading?

Last but not least, set a time aside to review this goal and decide how you and your child will evaluate if it has been achieved.

According to Hattie, setting goals has a high effect size of 0.50 (See table below). Encouraging the transparency between home and school will only highlight for your child that together with their teacher, we are all here to ensure success in learning.

NEW 'RE' CURRICULUM

Last Friday (28th February), Mr Rosato, Miss Joseph, Mrs Wilson, Miss Ahern, Mrs Wakim and myself attended the CEDP System New RE Curriculum Ignite Day. We too, like our students had a learning intention for the day; We are learning to develop *Knowledge, Skills and Attitudes* to lead the implementation of the Draft RE Curriculum. With the help of Professor Anthony Maher and CEDP Formation Leaders we unpacked the rationale and the formation dispositions. The rationale for the new curriculum is -

Education within the Diocese of Parramatta is a ministry of the Catholic Church, walking with humility in the way of Jesus, serving all of God's people.

One of the points of robust discussion was the 'inclusive' phrase of 'serving all of God's people'. Bishop Vincent has called on Catholic schools to be the living face of Christ to our students and their families. In his words, "Ours are not schools that provide education for Catholics only but Catholic education for all." The rationale certainly affirms the Bishop's position.

Drawing upon the Rationale, Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta recognises the following Dispositions: Head (cognition), Heart (affectivity), and Hand (praxis), as essential prerequisites for Teaching and Learning.

Head Be Attentive; Be Intelligent; Be Reasonable; Be Responsible

Heart Be Contemplative; Be Empathetic; Be Humble; Be Loving

Hand Be Present; Be Active; Be Compassionate; Be Effective

We discussed the dispositions as a 'way of being'.

Greg Whitby our director spoke of how the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta is committed to a transformation model of education that puts the personal learning growth of young people at the centre.

It is truly a very exciting time for our staff and students here at Bethany.

Something you may hear a lot from your child or in maths class is 'friends of ten'. *Friends of ten* refers to the number pairs that total to 10.

Fast recall of these number pairs is beneficial for your child's progress in maths. You could quiz your child with a few numbers each night to help in their fast recall of their *friends of ten*. Want to take it a step further? Why not help them to learn their *friends of 20*? Recognising their *friends of 20* will help them notice number patterns in larger sums later on.

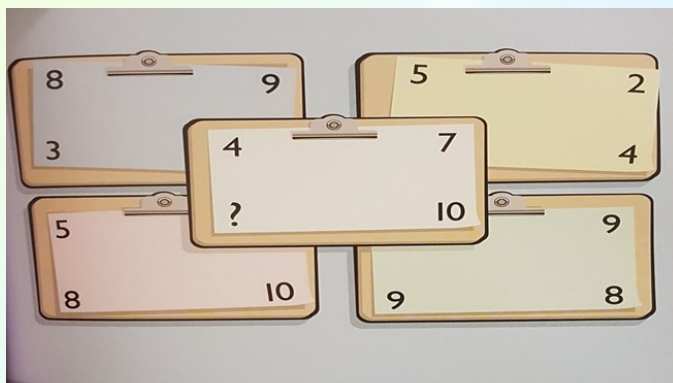
A great way to spend time with your children is to engage together in a maths activity. This not only encourages conversation and bonding, but has the added benefit of honing maths skills.

- Research shows clearly that attendance patterns are established early in a child's schooling.
- A child's Year 1 attendance is often a predictor of future attendance patterns.
- The effects of unwarranted school absenteeism accumulate quickly over time and affect children's development now and into the future.

We all need to work together to ensure that students are at school every day possible – barring illness. Remember if your child is unwell they should be kept at home and ideally seek medical advice.

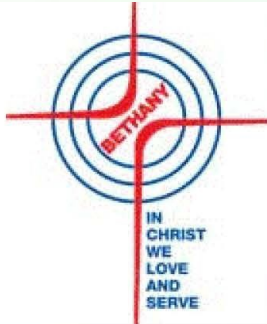
