#### **Annual Presentation Assembly**

The ceremony yesterday acknowledged the many students who this year have distinguished themselves in a variety of areas of school life.

In my principal's address I spoke to the students on the subject of dreams. Not the kind they have while they are sleeping but the kind that allows them to imagine what might be possible. Dreaming allows us to imagine different ways of doing things or a different way of thinking or being – it's where many great inventions, ideas, pieces of art and music have begun. Without a dream **Nelson Mandela** never would have brought South Africa together. Without a dream **Martin Luther King** would never have brought people to an understanding that all people are equal. Without a dream **St Mary of the Cross** would never have opened schools for poor children.

I shared with the students a book I'd read recently about a young American University Professor called **Randy Pausch**. A few years ago, the science professor stepped in front of an audience of 400 of his students to deliver his last lecture called "Really Achieving Your Childhood Dreams."

It was a remarkable speech because he spoke to his students about how important it is to dream and how amazing it feels to know you are working towards achieving your dreams. It was called **the last lecture** because Professor Pausch was seriously ill. Despite this, his last lecture was not sad but filled with passion, enthusiasm and fun.

Professor Pausch went through <u>his</u> childhood dream list. These were the 5 dreams that he imagined as a child:

- 1. Being able to experience zero gravity like the astronauts.
- 2. Playing in the National Football League.
- 3. Writing an article in the World Book Encyclopedia. (These were a set of books that people had to find information before google)
- 4.Being one of the guys who won the big stuffed animals in the amusement park.
- 5. Being Captain Kirk from Star Trek

Now these were some pretty big dreams and as you can imagine, there were some pretty big obstacles he had to overcome if he was going to achieve these dreams.

He said that things that are hard to achieve are like brick walls. These brick walls are there for a reason. The brick walls are not there to keep us out but are there to give us a chance to show how badly we want something - in other words we have to persevere and put in effort in order to achieve the things we want.

He told his students that he went on to attain almost all of those dreams, but not always exactly in the way he had imagined. He encouraged his students to cherish people rather than things as people are much more important than material objects.

He explained that even if you don't achieve your dreams entirely you still get a lot out of life by trying for it – really important things like teamwork, humility, sportsmanship & perseverance.

He challenged his students to be like the character **Tigger** in <u>Winnie the Pooh</u> - positive, enthusiastic, always full of bounce and optimism - because these are the characteristics that can break down brick walls.

And he warned them not to be like **Eeyore**, who always sees the **S** negative and is full of doom and gloom – these are the characteristics that make you crash into the brick wall!

To finish his lecture the Professor listed 4 pieces of life advice that he recommended for his students.

- 1. Tell the truth
- 2. Show gratitude say and show thanks to people
- 3. Everyone has a good side sometimes it takes a long time for them to show it but everyone has one, so be patient.
- 4. Apologise properly and sincerely when you make a mistake. (And everyone makes mistakes) He pointed out that an apology should have 3 essential parts:


First part, saying "I'm sorry", followed by, "It's my fault" and then thinking , "How do I make it right?"

In other words if you live properly with some solid guiding principles then your dreams will become much more achievable.
